Today, one million animal and plant species are threatened with extinction—the highest number ever in human history. What will life be like for our children and grandchildren—will their soil and water be clean enough for plants and pollinators like butterflies, bees, and hummingbirds to thrive? Will the wolf's howl echo across the mountains? Will herds of bison gather across the valleys to graze on fresh grass in the spring? Will there still be stories of the ghost cat, the elusive snow leopard, climbing the steep snow-capped mountains? If pollinators such as bees, butterflies, and bats continue to decline rapidly, we all suffer from loss of food resources. It is all connected.

The loss of biodiversity is unprecedented, accelerating, and yet, we still have a choice. Collectively, we have the ability to change course. And it is the only logical choice: a healthy planet provides sustainable food, shelter, clothing, and temperatures that support all life. But our old broken systems cannot solve these problems. We need new sustainable systems not only for humanity's way of life but also for protecting our planet's precious biodiversity. These are nature-based solutions that allow humanity to work with Nature instead of working against her. And, as communities embrace the concepts of re-wilding and restoring native ecosystems, learning how to coexist with nature is the key to avoiding the mistakes of our past and healing our future.

The International Wildlife Coexistence Network is an inclusive organization of experts in methods and strategies to transform conflicts between people and wildlife into long term solutions. We mobilize interdisciplinary teams through crowdsourcing to create new solutions to chronic or "wicked" problems between people and wildlife. And we work with the community to ensure that these solutions create lasting benefits to both the natural world and the people who live with wildlife.

We share our resources and provide widespread support for all who seek to peacefully resolve conflicts with wildlife. Our interdisciplinary teams include scientists, agricultural managers, researchers, ethicists, economists, government specialists, educators, indigenous leaders, technical engineers and more who are helping to create new and sustainable ways to live with wildlife. When possible, we connect our experts with communities that need help transforming wildlife conflicts into non-violent sustainable solutions.






2022 Major Milestones

Field Project Highlights

Voyageurs: A Fence for Coexistence

IWCN helped save the lives of the Windsong wolf pack in Voyageurs National Park. Over 100 wolves had been killed over decades despite attempts to stop the conflicts from occurring. IWCN assisted the university researchers devise a better strategy that has finally stopped the killing of wolves and provided funding toward building the 7 miles of fencing.

Foxlights to protect snow leopards and wolves for coexistence partner Third Pole Conservancy in Nepal and for ranchers in Colorado who are living with wolves for the first time in generations.



The Wood River Wolf Project celebrated its 15th year since it began in 2008. IWCN is the project's fiscal manager and IWCN's director Suzanne Asha Stone is the project supervisor and co-founder. In 2022, nearly 20,000 sheep grazed in the project area and only three were lost to wolves. The project has successfully maintained the lowest loss of sheep and wolves in the western wolf range while using nonlethal methods to protect livestock. In the history of the project, only two wolves were killed due to conflicts with livestock in the project area.

IWCN Coexistence Conference

IWCN organized the first international wildlife coexistence conference bringing together leaders and scientists from Australia, Asia, Africa, Europe, the Middle East, North America, South America, and the United Kingdom to share research, resources, and build a larger network of wildlife coexistence collaborators. 








2022 Annual Expenses and Income
